Major Project: List of Past and Current WARA Clubs



The WARA Museum is keen to compile a comprehensive list of rifle clubs affiliated with WARA (previously the National Rifle Association of WA), the date they were established and the colours, if any, used on club clothing or insignia. Some 294 Clubs have been identified. Your assistance supplying evidence to complete, correct or update this list is welcomed.

The dates for establishment are based largely on news reports of the actual formation of a club. Some dates are prefixed with "c" (circa) to indicate a degree of uncertainty. No dates are provided where there is significant uncertainty.

Clubs created to primarily fast track enlistment for WW1 are not included in the list. Boans Bros Rifle and Wholesale Softgoods Clubs were formed in 1915 and ceased by 1918. The Crown Law Rifle Club (1915) merged with Perth Rifle Club in 1918. Similarly, the Post and Telegraph, Nokarnie, Kings Park, Hines Hill, Cowcowing, Newcarnie, Bayswater, Commercial Travelers, WAGR, YMCA, Water Supply, East Fremantle, Highbury, Perth City Council, AO Foresters, Insurance, Darlington, Kalamunda, Hines Hill, Woyerling (East Pingelly) and Payne's Find clubs have not included until further information is obtained to demonstrate they had a sporting purpose.

District Associations

District rifle unions (now associations) were formed in 1910 following the adoption of a new constitution for the NRA of WA. The new constitution resolved the split between the clubs that formed the Goldfields and Coastal divisions of the NRA of WA. There were approximately 5,400 members at the time.

The first Unions were (Daily News, Saturday 30 April 1910, page 8): **The Metropolitan District** head quartered at Karrakatta Rifle Range: Moora, Wooroloo, Gingin, Darling Range, Midland Junction, Jarrahdale, Armadale, South Perth, Leederville, Perth, Fremantle district and Police rifle clubs.

The South Western District head quartered at Bunbury: Drakesbrook, Yarloop, Harvey, Mornington, Roelands, Bunbury, Lyall's Mill, Collie-Worsley, Wellington Mills, Preston Valley, Bridgetown, Moodearrup, Darkan, Boyanup, West Arthur, Arthur River, Busselton, Margaret River, Timber Corporation (Greenbushes), Karridale and Mines (Cardiff) rifle clubs.

The Eastern District head quartered at Northam: Dowerin; Goomalling, Newcastle, Merredin, York, Kellerberrin, Beverley, Boyagarra, Northam, Brookton, Pingelly and Cunderdin rifle clubs.

The Great Southern District head quartered at Wagin: Wardering, Narrogin, Wagin, Katanning, Nookenillup. Kojonup, Broomehill, Mount Barker, Popanyinning, Cuballing, Woodanilling, Wurgabup, Cranbrook-Frankland and Plantagenet (Albany) rifle clubs. Annual Prize meetings were held at Wagin and then Albany from 1924 (Great Southern Herald 31 December 1924)

The Eastern Goldfields District head quartered at Kalgoorlie: Menzies, Mulline, Davyhurst, Broad Arrow-Paddington, Bardoc, Gindalbie, Kanowna, Kalgoorlie, Boulder, Bulong, Coolgardie, Southern Cross, Ora Banda, Waverley, Norseman, Phillips River and Eucla rifle clubs.

The Northern Goldfields District head quartered at Mount Morgans: Mount Ida, Sir Samuel, Lake Darlot, Gwalia, Vivien, Lawlers, Lancefield, Laverton, Ida H, Burtville, Mertondale, Mount Morgans, Malcolm, Murrin Murrin, Yundamindera, Anaconda and Kookynie rifle clubs.

The North Western District head quartered at Geraldton: Boogardie, Derby, Broome, Geraldton, Roebourne, Carnarvon, Wiluna, Mount Erin, Maninga, Marley, Black Range, Cue, Nannine, Meekatharra, Northampton, Eradu, Mullewa, Day Dawn, Lennonville, Mount Magnet, Yalgoo and Greenough rifle clubs.

The Central [Wheatbelt] District Rifle Union. The West Australian reported in 1919 that "Owing to the increase of clubs in the Merredin-Bruce Rock district, it has been decided to form another union to consist of the clubs in that area. The new union will start from November 1, and will comprise the Merredin, Bruce Rock, Babakin, Wyalkatchem. Kunnunoppin. Hines Hill, Cowcowing, Trayning. Totedjin Westonia, Corrigin, Newcarnie, and Nokaning Rifle Clubs, the headquarters being at Merredin."

The Midlands Districts Rifle Union was created in c1930 and head quartered at Ballidu. Clubs included: Ballidu, Namban, Moora, Round Hill, Buntine, Dalwallinu, Wongan Hills and St Ildephonsus (at New Norcia) rifle clubs.

The Murray District Rifle Union was formed in 1950 and head quartered at Harvey. Clubs included: Roelands, Harvey, Yarloop, Waroona, Jarrahdale, Mandurah, North Dandalup, Banksiadale, Forrest and Boddington rifle clubs (Harvey-Waroona Mail Friday 10 March 1950, page 4).

The Roe District Rifle Union head quartered at Lake Grace was formed in c1950. Clubs included Dumbleyung, Karlgarin-Hyden, Kulin, Kukerin, Lake Grace, Newdegate and Nyabing rifle clubs. Great Southern Herald, Friday 1 September 1950, page 11

¹ Clubs and dates established are derived from WARA records, TROVE and the Australian Light Horse Studies Centre. The latter source lists rifle clubs in 1910 that provided militia training and where in 1913 militia units and activities were removed in favour of local rifle clubs following the implementation of the 1910 Kitchener Report.

The town was initially called Harris but changed to Vivien due to the Vivien gold and gem mines. The name Vivien is thought to be in honour of the author May Vivienne, whose book about her travels about the Western Australian goldfields was published in 1902.

- cxxxix Post WW2 State Roll has most members enrolling from 1946. Two members were enrolled in 1930 (Allen Sibley) and 1936 (Sam Ingram). Last enrolment was 1959.
- cxl Between Laverton and Leonora. Also spelt Yundamindera.
- cxli 90km southwest of Sandstone
